Code Enforcement – \$1,044,000

Program responsible for enforcement of City Ordinances and State Statutes regarding property maintenance standards. Also provides the abatement action needed for overgrown vacant properties and the oversight of the Code Enforcement Authority Special Magistrate System.

- Ensure compliance with community property standards and protect public health, safety and welfare.

Code Enforcement – Zoning/Housing – \$100,700

Program responsible for enforcement of the city’s zoning and land development regulations along with the minimum housing code. Also cites occupied residences that don’t have the required sanitation service.

- Prevent possible unhealthy and unsanitary conditions within the community.

Recent Code Enforcement Initiatives

Foreclosure Program – Non-homesteaded properties that have an extensive history of code violations are reviewed for possible foreclosure action. To date, eight properties have been processed through this program.

Abandoned Cemeteries – Staff has worked to engage the community in an effort to recognize the need for a long-term maintenance plan to deal with abandoned cemeteries. The City of Pensacola, the University of West Florida and Keep Pensacola Beautiful have been primary sponsors involved in this effort.



Residential Garbage Collection – \$2,759,800

Program responsible for the administrative activities of the department as well as oversight of the daily sanitation collection operations.

Program responsible for providing curbside recycling collection services to city sanitation customers.

Transfer Station – \$367,200

Program responsible for providing transfer station services for the yard trash, bulk waste and recycling operations.



Objectives

EFFICIENT

- Reduce the number of vehicle trips to the landfill by utilizing the city's transfer station which results in lower transport cost and improved efficiency of the collection crews working in the neighborhoods.

CLEAN

- Operate the station in full compliance with FDEP regulatory requirements.

Yard Trash/Bulk Waste Collection – \$1,572,400

Program responsible for providing yard trash and bulk waste collection to city residents. Also provides collection resources for the monthly Mayor's Neighborhood Cleanup events.



Objectives

EFFICIENT

- Provide cost effective, convenient, quality yard trash and bulk waste services to city residents on a regularly scheduled collection day.
- Provide scheduled and non-scheduled bulk waste pick up to address the needs of customers and to help keep city neighborhoods free of curbside debris.

Recent Sanitation Initiatives

Recycling Processing Contract – In April 2014 when West Florida Recycling closed the City was left without a recycling processor within a reasonable driving distance. After several weeks of disposing of recyclables, the City began transporting recyclables to Montgomery on a short-term contract. In July the City began hauling recyclables to Tarpon Paper in Loxley on a trial basis, and by November the City had negotiated a two-year recyclable processing contract with the processor.

Interlocal Agreement with Escambia County – This agreement provides the City with free disposal of yard trash in exchange for Sanitation crews conducting ten neighborhood cleanups for the County. This agreement resulted in win-win for both entities. The City was able to reduce its disposal cost while the County is receiving neighborhood cleanups and clean yard trash that can be processed for use as daily cover at the landfill.



Sanitation Rate

Sanitation Rate – The rate ordinance established in 2007 provides for an adjustment in the Sanitation Rate based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Since 2007 the CPI has risen 15% but the only Sanitation Rate increase occurred in 2012 when a 2.7% increase resulted in a sixty cent monthly increase in the rate. This year, although the CPI went down one tenth of one percent, the recommendation is that Council waive the automatic adjustment and maintain the current Sanitation Rate of \$22.80 per month.



Central Garage – \$1,408,400

Program responsible for providing comprehensive management of all City vehicles and oversight of the city's automated fueling facility.



Objectives

ACCOUNTABLE

- Organize and maintain a comprehensive fleet management program that provides planning, repair and maintenance of the city's diverse fleet of equipment at an optimum cost.
