Hurricanes and Tropical Storms

Hurricanes and tropical storms are some of the most powerful storms known to man. Hurricane season begins June 1 and ends November 30 with the peak season from mid-August to late October. Start preparing now for you and your family in case a hurricane threatens this area.

Winds:

- $\frac{3}{4}$ Tropical Depression: Disturbed winds up to 38 mph
- $\frac{3}{4}$ Tropical Storm: Winds of 39 to 73 mph
- $\frac{3}{4}$ Hurricane: Winds of 74 mph or greater.

SAFFIR-SIMPSON SCALE

Category	Winds - mph	Damage	Storm Surge (ft)
1	74-95	Minimal	4-5
2	96-110	Moderate	6-8
3	111-130	Major	9-12
4	131-155	Severe	13-18

Storm surge is a rise in sea level across the coast. Along the immediate coast, storm surge is the greatest threat to life and property.

Hurricanes also produce tornadoes, which add to the hurricane's destructive power.

Warnings and Advisories - It is important to stay informed and know the difference between "watches" and "warnings."

Tropical Storm Watch: A tropical storm may pose a threat within 36 hours.

Tropical Storm Warning: Tropical storm conditions within 24 hours.

Hurricane Watch: Hurricane conditions threaten within 36 hours.

Hurricane Warning: Hurricane conditions within 24 hours.

Flooding - Flash flooding can occur due to the heavy rainfall, which is very dangerous on roads and in cities. Tropical storms produce more rain. Flooding is the worst storm hazard.

Evacuation Order: An evacuation order is only given in life-threatening emergencies. If you receive this order, you must leave your house immediately.

Care of Pets

Be sure their ID tags are up-to-date and that you have leashes or carriers for each pet. If your pet has medical or behavioral problems, tape that information to the carrier or leash. Prepare a waterproof evacuation kit for pets. It should include: Three to seven days of food, bottled water, recent photos of pets, paper towels, and garbage bags for cleanups. If you leave home and leave pets behind, place a "Pets Inside" sticker on front and back doors listing the number and kinds of pets inside.

Tools and Other Supplies

Create a basic tool kit with items to make temporary repairs after the storm. Also have plastic sheeting, paper plates, plastic utensils, flashlights, battery-operated radio, batteries, tent, matches, aluminum foil, plastic storage containers, and small shovel. A corded phone (not cordless - they require electricity) will help if you have phone lines but no power. Small, portable antennas will provide access to local television stations if there is power but no cable. Small televisions often have adapters for use in automobiles.

Clothing and Bedding

Clothing and bedding items should be protected by covering them with plastic drop cloths and placing them in waterproof boxes, plastic bags or other suitable containers. Be sure to have work boots and gloves, rain gear, blankets or sleeping bags, lots of towels, hats, and sunglasses.

Special Items

Always remember family members with special needs. Get prescriptions filled before a storm hits. Also have some form of entertainment for everyone. Keep all important family documents – such as wills, insurance policies, bank account numbers, credit cards, address books - in a waterproof container. Make a household inventory complete with serial numbers and pictures or video if possible.
